THE COURSES

Golf Digest World 100 Greatest Golf Courses ranking [When U.S. courses are included]

12 [23] SUNNINGDALE G.C. (OLD)

England / 6,627 yards, par 70

A Willie Park Jr. design that dates from 1901, it's perhaps the most advanced of its day. Chopped from a pine forest but routed like a links, with the ninth at the far end of the property, it plays like a links, too, for there's a sand base beneath the turf. The Old has big greens, as Park put a premium on approach putting, and artful bunkers, with both angled crossbunkers and necklaces of sand hampering direct routes to some greens. To American visitors, the look of Sunningdale brings to mind Pine Valley or Pinehurst.

Many amateur and professional golfing events have been played here including the News of the World Professional Match Play Championship, numerous European Open Championships, many Ladies Open Championships, the Walker Cup, International Final Qualification for the Open Championship, and the Senior Open Championship in 2015.

33 [92] SUNNINGDALE G.C. (NEW)

England / 6,729 yards, par 70

H.S. Colt, who was the club's secretary from 1901 to 1913, laid out the New Course in 1923, well after he'd established his reputation as a grand golf architect. It's considered by most to be tougher than Sunningdale Old, mainly because Colt's greens are smaller, with subtle contours that nudge balls toward bunkers hard along the collars. It's a toss-up as to which course is prettier. Both have fields of heather, gorse, Scotch broom and clusters of pine, oak and silver birch.

PRINCES G.C.

Sandwich, Kent, England / 6,680 yards, Par 71

The course was completed in 1906 with a layout that was among the first to counter the longer distances being achieved with the new breed of rubber-core golf balls. At just under 7,000 yards, it quickly gained a great reputation as a top quality links and an excellent test of golf.

In 1932 The Open visited Princes for what would prove to be the first and only time. Gene Sarazen set a new scoring record for the Championship of 283 using his newly invented sand wedge. The present-day 27-hole layout is the result of a 1950 re-design following war-time damage to the original course which was redesigned and rebuilt by Sir Guy Campbell and John Morrison. Princes will host final Open Championship qualifying on July 3rd for the 147th Open at Carnoustie, July 19-22, 2018.

22 [45] ROYAL ST. GEORGE'S G.C.

Sandwich, Kent, England / 7,204 yards, Par 70

Royal St. George's, in dunes along the English Channel, is what writer Adam Lawrence calls the ideal mix of championship golf and gentle quirks. Its quirks include a duo of massive bunkers that howl at tee shots on the par-5 fourth. Once as tall as a six-story building, they've eroded over the years, and have been stabilized the past 20 years by the addition of 93 railroad ties along their top edges. A longtime member of the Open rota, Royal St. George's was the site of Darren Clarke's surprise victory in 2011. Royal St George's is the venue for the 149th Open in 2020.

It has hosted 13 Open championships since 1894, when it became the first club outside Scotland to host the championship. Past champions include Darren Clarke (2011), Ben Curtis (2003), Greg Norman (1993), Sandy Lyle (1985), Bill Rogers (1981), Bobby Locke (1949), Reg Whitcombe (1938), Henry Cotton (1934), Walter Hagen (1928, 1922), Harry Vardon (1911, 1899), Jack White (1904) and John Henry Taylor (1894). It has also hosted The Amateur Championship on 13 occasions.

The club was founded in 1887 in a setting of wild duneland. Many holes feature blind or partially blind shots, although the unfairness element has been reduced somewhat, after several 20th century modifications. The club's Challenge Trophy dates from 1888 and is one of the oldest trophies in golf; it has been contested annually except for war years. The course also possesses the deepest bunker in championship golf, located on its fourth hole. Author Ian Fleming used the Royal St. George's course under the name "Royal St. Marks" in his 1959 novel *Goldfinger*.

FORMAT FOR THE 2018 PONCE DE LEON INTERNATIONAL MATCHES England (May 31 – June 2, 2018)

The Ponce De Leon Matches involve various match play competitions between two teams of sixteen players. Each player plays four matches. The matches consist of 16 FOURBALL matches, 8 FOURSOMES matches and 16 SINGLES matches. The winner of each match scores a point for their team, with ½ a point each for any match that is tied after 18 holes.

There will be 40 matches, so the winning team needs to score at least 20.5 points. In the event of a 20-20 tie, the match will result in a tie.

Notes:

* You do not need to check-in at pro shops. All tournament rounds have been paid for by our hosts at all golf clubs.

* All scorecards will be dotted off of the lowest handicap in the group. (For example, if Player A is a 7, B = 9, C = 11 and D=12, all players will stroke off of Player A. Player A will have no dots, Player B will have 2, C will have 4 and D will have 5 strokes. The strokes will begin on the #1 Handicap Hole and go down. Player B will have dots on 1 and 2, C on 1-4 and D on 1-5.)

* The tournament Committee (Clive, Battle and N. Thomson) reserve the right to adjust any or all handicaps in between any round of the tournament, settle any rules disputes or use their discretion to alter these rules when appropriate.

* For handicaps, we took the British team handicaps at face-value. For the Americans, we took their May 1st Handicap Indexes and applied RSG's Medal Tee Slope (145) to create Course Handicaps.

* George Peper, former Golf magazine editor and American living in St. Andrews devoted a chapter in his book about how his USGA Handicap and his CONGU handicap have absolutely no similarity and are five or more strokes apart. Wes reached out to Dean Knuth, "the Pope of Slope", who created the USGA's Course Rating and Slope system, and asked his advice on how to compare the UK and USA handicap systems. Knuth's response? "It can't be done." So we have done the best we could. *There is good news on the way*. The USGA and R&A announced plans for a unified World Handicap System to be rolled out in 2020. Stay tuned...

Matchup Selection Process

After the morning Foursomes matches, 24 points will have been awarded and 16 are up for grabs in Singles. After the completion of morning play, Captains Clive and Battle will select the pairings for the afternoon matches using the following format. The purpose of the format is to give the team that is losing an opportunity to choose as many favorable matchups as possible. Chairman Emeritus Thomson will run the process.

Definitions: Slot – to place a player in a twosome, unopposed. Match – to place a player in a twosome against an already slotted player.

If the score of the team match is:

12-12 to 13-11: Both teams will slot 8 and match 8 players.

Procedure: If the match is tied, there will be a coin flip. (If not, Winning team will slot first two players) The loser of the coin flip will slot his first two players. Winner slots 2 then matches 2 players. This process repeats until 32 players have been matched.

13.5-10.5 to 14-10: The losing team will match 10 players and the winning team will match 6. **Procedure:**

Winning team slots 2 players. The losing matches 2 then slots 2. (6) Winning team slots 2 then matches 2 players. (10) The loser matches 2 then slots 2. (14) Winning team slots 2 then matches 2 players. (18) The loser matches 2 then slots 2. (22) Winning team slots 4 then matches 2 players. (28) Losing team matches 4. (32)

14.5-9.5 or 15.5-8.5: The losing team will match 12 players and the winning team will match 4.

Procedure: Winning team slots 2 players. The losing matches 2 then slots 2. (6) Winning team slots 2 then matches 2 players. (10) The loser matches 2 then slots 2. (14) Winning team slots 8 then matches 2 players. (24) The loser matches 8 (32)

16-8 or greater margin:<u>Procedure:</u>The winning Captain will slot all 16 players and the losing Captain will match all pairings.

CHAMPIONS DINNER & WAGER

In keeping with the spirit of the Ponce, the U.S. Team challenges the U.K. team to play for the Champions Dinner and its pre-selected price, *not to exceed* 150 GBP per person. If accepted, the winning team will enjoy the Saturday Champions Dinner at the expense of the losing team. In the event of a tie, each team pays for their own fare. All tournament awards are to be recognized on Saturday evening at the Champions Dinner.

The speaker at the Championship Dinner will be **Mark Burnyeat.** Mark is a financier in London with a great affinity for Golf and Royal St George's. A past Captain of both Royal St George's and New Zealand Golf clubs, Mark is currently the recorder of the Match Club and a member of a great many prestigious golf clubs. He lives in London and Kent and will immediately understand and even embody the spirit of the Ponce de Leon International.

AWARDS

Ponce de Leon Matches Trophy: the conquistador helmet will be given to the winning team. That team will possess the Helmet until the next Match. The winning team is responsible for engraving winning team player names / year on the Helmet prior to the next Match. In the event of a tie, both teams will share time with the helmet. Consumption of spirits from the Helmet is encouraged.

British MVP: to be voted via secret ballot by British team only. Open discussion at the beginning of the meal is encouraged, so that voting members are made aware of individual match records and noteworthy performances. The British MVP will receive a set of five hickory-shaft clubs in an old Tom Morris bag from the Ponce's charitable gift to St. Andrews' Keepers of the Green initiative to be passed down to future MVPs.

The Davis Love III American MVP Award is voted via secret ballot by American team only. Like his counterpart, the American MVP receives five hickory-shaft clubs in an old Tom Morris bag.

The Tony Jacklin Spirit Award is awarded to the British player who best exemplifies team spirit, sportsmanship, and leadership. The Tony Jacklin winner is the British man who best embodies the Ponce, both on and off the course. The American players are provided the opportunity (by written, secret ballot) to nominate whom they think should win this British award, and the Chairman Emeritus, Event Chairman and team captains take these nominations under advisement and consider them strongly.

The Ted Oakey Spirit Award is awarded to the American player who best exemplifies team spirit, sportsmanship and leadership of Ted Oakey. The Ted Oakey winner is the American who best embodies the Ponce, both on and off the course. The British players are provided the opportunity (by written, secret ballot) to nominate whom they think should win this American award, and the Chairman Emeritus, Event Chairman and team captains take these nominations under advisement and consider them strongly.

The Wooden Spoon is awarded to the member of each team who clearly demonstrates his commitment to horrible, losing golf over the course of the matches. Typically, this prestigious award is given to the member of each team who scores the least points in the tournament, but other behavior may be considered.

PAST RESULTS

Each team has won one apiece. No visiting team has ever won on foreign soil.

U.K. WINS INAUGURAL PONCE DE LEON INTERNATIONAL MATCHES 19-16 June 7-10, 2012 in Saint Andrews, Scotland

14 Americans trekked across the pond to play a four-round tournament over three days against 14 players from the U.K. Evening events at the Ben Hogan Suite at Carnoustie Golf Links, Saint Andrews Golf Club and R&A capped off some great days of golf in and around Saint Andrews.

The U.K. were apparently unfazed by the American caddie bibs and came out and blitzed the Yanks on the first day in blustery conditions at Carnoustie, winning five, halving one and losing only one match. The Americans would come back on day two, winning five of the seven matches to make it anyone's golf tournament. As the matches shifted to Kingsbarns, the U.K. rebounded for a 4.5-2.5 win in alternate shot. That same afternoon, the teams split the singles matches at 7 apiece, giving the matches to the U.K. 19-16.

USA TROUNCES UK 21-9 IN 2nd PDL INTERNATIONAL MATCHES July 23-27, 2014 at Sea Island, GA

The U.S. won a tightly contested Day 1 Four Ball 3.5-2.5 at Retreat. Day Two saw the U.S. take control of Foursomes 4.5-1.5 at Plantation to take an 8-4 lead. But it was the afternoon 18 Four Balls at Seaside where the Yanks ended any real hopes the Brits had at a comeback with a historic 6-0 sweep to take an insurmountable 14-4 lead. Team USA won Singles 7-5 to claim the Conquistador helmet 21-9. The Americans were led by two players who went undefeated (4-0): Michael Aide and Wes Battle.

In a purely poetic ending, Chairman Palmore was trailing by 2 with 5 holes to play in singles against Richard Moger. Palmore scratched back to tie the match on 17. The duel would be decided on 18. After making par, Palmore conceded a cagey par putt to Moger to halve the match. Although not as much on the line as the famous Nicklaus-Jacklin concession at the 1969 Ryder Cup, the gesture evoked the sportsmanship and spirit of the moment and provided a fitting end to the competition.

HISTORY OF THE PONCE

Looking to hold a golf challenge with his friends, Neil Thomson decided to introduce a golf event similar to the Ryder Cup in January 2003. In the early days, there was no assurance that there would be enough interest for the tournament to become an annual event. Thomson proposed the event be called The Ponce De Leon Invitational.

Many decisions from the early days of the Tournament remain today. Among these are the 4 rounds of competitive play, allowing the singles matches to be selected by the Captains, and, of course, the Final Round Singles matches.

The first tournament was held the first week of January, 2003 with just 8 players. Typically, the field is 16 strong with a waiting list of at least that many. The Ponce is scheduled each year and played at the World's finest golf venues. To assist the community, each year a generous contribution is made by the players of the Tournament benefiting a charity that is selected by that year's Chairman.

The International Matches were hashed out over a few pints at the Open Championship at Royal St. Georges in 2011 when Chairman Battle, U.K. Captain Dom Clive and sometimes Yank and sometimes Brit Kirk Bedell decided that they would assemble teams to meet in St. Andrews in 2012.

We hope that the Ponce stages a golf tournament that is enjoyable to our players, patrons and the golf community.

THE ABF SOLDIERS' CHARITY

The 2018 charity is ABF The Soldiers' Charity (formerly the Army Benevolent Fund), the National Charity of the British Army, offering a lifetime of support to soldiers, veterans and their immediate families when in need. Their priorities are to help these individuals by making grants to them through the Regimental and Corps Associations, and to support a wide range of specialist charities that sustain the British Army 'family', both at home and around the world. Their mantra is to provide "A hand up, not a hand out". Whilst this term has become somewhat clichéd, none is more apt than President John F Kennedy's use of the term (in 1961), defining it as "doing something towards becoming self-sustaining" – this is exactly how we see it today.


ETIQUETTE

The tie that binds of course is none other than the greatest golf course architect of all-time, Harry Shapland Colt, who designed Sunningdale (New) in 1923 and Seaside in 1929. Colt was a varsity golfer at Cambridge; then a lawyer; next founding member of the R&A's Rules Committee; before ascending to serve as Sunningdale's first club secretary in 1902. He is widely known as the father of British golf course design (Royal Lytham & St. Anne's; Royal Portrush to name a few) and paved the way for the Golden Age of golf architecture globally and the pioneer of the "Philadelphia school" (Wilson, Tillinghast, Crump and Thomas). What an honor to proceed in our never-ending golf odyssey to the "Heathlands" outside London!

For the Match to then migrate to the coast at Royal St. George's for the 3rd & 4th rounds will be truly epic. Who will hoist the helmet in Sandwich on Saturday night!!! ~ what drama to ensue.

We are truly blessed to compete on such grand and historic stages. It is quite humbling to note that RSG follows a growing lineage of Ponce courses which have also hosted professional golf majors: The Old Course; Carnoustie; Pinehurst No. 2; and PGA National.
